Pastor Doug's Letter: May 28, 2013

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Grace to you and peace from Father, Jesus, and Spirit.

Cracks become Crevasses at Crises.

This is the title of a book that I have threatened to write some day. The thesis of the book is that the stress of a crisis - whether it be personal, familial, or community – can put such weight on relationships that minor fractures or faults become major divisions and conflicts.

Just this past week, the Interstate 5 Bridge over the Skagit River north of Seattle collapsed into the water after an oversized truck load clipped the steel truss. In an AP article filed on May 26, Mike Baker and Joan Lowy reported that:

Thousands of bridges around the U.S. may be one freak accident or mistake away from collapse, even if the spans are deemed structurally sound.

The crossings are kept standing by engineering design, not supported with brute strength or redundant protections like their more modern counterparts. Bridge regulators call the more risky spans "fracture critical," meaning that if a single, vital component of the bridge is compromised, it can crumple...

... The most famous failure of a fracture critical bridge was the collapse of the I-35W bridge in Minneapolis during rush hour on Aug. 1, 2007, killing 13 people and injuring more than 100 others. The National Transportation Safety Board concluded that the cause of the collapse was an error by the bridge's designers — a gusset plate, a key component of the bridge, was too thin. The plate was only half of the required one-inch thickness.

Because the bridge's key structures lacked redundancy, where if one piece fails, there is another piece to prevent the bridge from falling, when the gusset plate broke, much of the bridge collapsed.

Relationships can collapse in the same kind of way. A common type of stress for family relationships is a death or an illness in a family. As one who is often present at such times, I have observed these collapses, and, indeed, I work to prevent them.

For example, in the midst of an unexpected medical crises a family can find itself in the totally unfamiliar environment of an intensive care unit with a bewildering array of beeping and buzzing machines confronted with the need to make a major medical

decision. When the family is harmonious and the relationships are stable, the family usually can come to a consensus. However, families with strained relationships can have such strong disagreements that they might never speak to each other again.

I mention illness and death as stressors because everyone experiences these during their life. They are simply the most common ones. Other stressors can be quite individualized so that what puts pressure on one person may do exactly the opposite for another. The point is that we all have them.

We also all have cracks, weak places in our selves and in our relationships. Common cracks include unforgiveness, secrets, and dysfunctional behavior. These cracks may be small and insignificant when there is no pressure on them, but in the middle of a crises they can break, resulting in broken lives, broken families, and broken communities.

As in bridges so it is true of lives, the foundation must be strong, and the stresses balanced appropriately. That is why Jesus concluded his Sermon on the Mount with the illustration of two houses, one built on solid rock and the other built on sand. Both were subjected to the stress of wind, rain, and flood, but only one collapsed. Foundations are important. Unattended cracks are important.

Christians know that the foundation is Jesus; the source of our beliefs and values and the direction of our intentions and actions. What we often fail to pay attention to are the cracks.

In the sermon Jesus invites us to consider the cracks of name calling, inappropriate looks, boastful promises, stingy helpfulness, and circumscribed love. He calls us to pay attention to our prayers, our generosity, and our self-sacrifice. With uncomfortable honesty and specific detail he describes crack creating conditions, and he challenges us to pay attention to these small matters before they become fracture critical.

This is what is hardest about following the ways of Jesus. When there are no stressor storms, we tend to ignore the small cracks in our lives because there is always another day to attend to it. Then the truck of trouble hits that exact weak spot, and the bridge to the future collapses into rubble.

Oh yes, bridges, and lives, can be rebuilt. But how much better is it not to collapse in the first place because every small crack is mended immediately.


Blessing of the Graduates

Today we honor the high school graduates who are members of our Ministry Body, and we bless them as they make this significant transition. The Scriptures for today speak to this time of transition, and they give to all of us a message upon which we can build our lives: *Go. Come. Do.*

Raise the Dead



In our Scripture lessons today we have three stories of persons who have been raised from the dead by the power of God. The prophet Elijah prays for the dead son of the widow who has been supporting him in the midst of a famine. He comes back to life. In the Gospel Jesus stops a funeral procession in Nain and raises a dead son to life. Paul tells the Galatians that he was living a death-dealing life persecuting the church until God raised him from the dead. These three stories remind us of Jesus command to his disciples: "Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, cast out demons.

June 16 4th Sunday after Pentecost

Blessing of Fathers

2 Samuel 11:26—12:10; 12:13–15 Psalm 32

Galatians 2:15-21

Luke 7:36—8:3

Know Your Sin. Know Your Forgiveness.

Today our nation celebrates Father's Day and we take the time to remember our fathers, to give thanks to God for them, and to ask God's blessing upon them. Ironically, the theme of all three lessons is that of adultery: David committing adultery with Bathsheba, the Galatians committing adultery with the grace of God, and Jesus forgiving an adulterous woman who anoints his feet with perfume. Adultery destroys marriages and fatherhood. However, in each of these three lessons God teaches us that there are things worse than adultery, God teaches us the secret of living a sinless life.

5th Sunday after Pentecost Baptisms: Braxton White, 8:15 / Emmy DeFrancisco, 10:30 Isaiah 65:1-9 Psalm 22:19-28 Galatians 3:23-29 Luke 8:26-39

The Hound of Heaven

Galatians 5:1, 13-25

The Scripture lessons today speak of the God who searches out and saves those who are bound with chains. Isaiah tells the rebellious people of God who are fleeing from God and delighting in evil that, even so, God will find and save. The psalmist calls upon God for that saving to come quickly. Paul tells the Galatians that they have been bound with the most impossible chains to break, but Christ breaks them anyway. Finally, Jesus finds a man chained by evil and shackles, and Jesus frees him with a word.

Forward Following Face

Today's Scriptures invite us to follow God. Elijah is challenged to follow when threats fill him with fear, and he finds Elisha in order to invite him to follow God instead of following oxen. The psalmist rejoices in those who choose to follow God and discover the resulting "goodly heritage." Paul calls us to follow the Spirit instead of the flesh, for those who follow the flesh do not inherit the kingdom of God, while those who follow the Spirit do. In the Gospel lesson, Jesus chooses to follow God's call to the cross and invites others to follow him. They decline.

REPORTS:

The minutes from the Guardian's meeting of March 14, 2013 were reviewed; Mike Murray moved to accept the minutes, Lisa Brooks seconded, and the motion was approved.

Pastor Doug, Lisa Brooks and Stacy Wright reported on the progress of **The Journey Forward Initiative** and provided the following information

- The JF Team chose Pete Anderson to be its chairperson.
 Mark Timberlake has resigned from the team. They will choose a secretary at their next meeting on May 30, 2013.

 Pastor also suggested they choose a Listening-to-God Recorder as well.
- The JF Team is developing an Action Plan to encourage the knowledge of, use of, and the participation in the Gift-Based, Team-Oriented, Ministry Body concept. They are going to hold a resource Fair on September 8 and make it the same day as the Kick-Off day for Sunday School. They consider the mission statement, goals, values, and vision statement of SPLC to be an adequate reflection of the current mission and orientation of the team.
- The JF Team wants to focus on the action plan of strengthening St. Paul's present mission and structure before wrestling with the following issues: the Worship Space, our use of technology (texting, projection, Facebook, website), and how to attract the Millennial generation (16-30 age group). They felt that these are questions that the Guardians, the Technology Team and the Ministry Body as a whole should address.
- The JF Team encouraged Pastor Doug to emphasize his teaching ministry and do more of it.
- Paul Martin has completed the Asset Inventory requested

by the synod and Pastor Doug has forwarded it to the synod.

 Barb Hoover has completed the inventory that is requested to be part of the Journey Forward process by the synod and Pastor Doug has forwarded that report, along with the response to the Strategic Questionnaire completed by the JF Team, The Guardians, and the Ministry Leaders.

Nancy Martin has been unable to find a volunteer to be the Nursery Coordinator. It was also reported that the early service has not had any children in the nursery.

NEW BUSINESS:

Chris Laux moved that the Guardians approve Pastor Doug's request of the following:

- vacation time: July 11-31, and December 26-31, 2013
- to attend a week-long prayer retreat August 22-30, 2013
- to attend the Conference on Biblical Preaching October 7-10, 2013
- to be the Spiritual Director on the Men's Via de Cristo weekend, the weekend after Easter 2014, April 24-27, 2014.

Mindy Wood seconded the motion and all were in favor.

The **Building Resource Report** was received:

Doug Shirk and Paul Garn are recommending:

- 1. Replacing the roof over the office portion of the church as quickly as possible since it is currently leaking.
- 2. Adam Brokaw Construction has submitted the best quote with a cost of \$16,100.00. This is for a 24 gauge metal roof.
- 3. In addition, Adam is quoting \$7,400.00 for new downspouts, gutters, fascia and soffits
- 4. If both options are accepted, the total cost would be \$23,500.00.
- An additional cost that could be incurred would be replacing any of the wood sheeting that is bad--this will not be known until the current roof is removed.

Guardian's Minutes: May 16, 2013 - Continued

The Finance Team Report was received:

The Finance Team supports the request submitted by Doug and Paul. The money to pay for the request is not currently available. A capital fund request project or a new loan would need to be undertaken to raise the needed funds.

Additional items that were discussed:

- 1. A section of the roof over the sanctuary may be bad and need replaced. Adam submitted a cost of \$33,000.00 for this work. Doug Shirk and Paul Garn are going to do further investigation and report back.
- 2. A quotation of \$11,345.00 has been received for replacing the windows in the office building. Doug and Paul have been asked to talk further with the supplier and request a cost/benefit analysis be provided.
- 3. A quotation of \$2,450.00 was received for patching, sealing and striping the two parking lots. The money is available in the building fund and approval to go ahead with the work was obtained. Mike Murray moved to hold on sealing the parking lot if a formal contract had not been signed. Stacy Wright seconded and all were in favor. Chris Laux offered to contact Paul Garn to find out if a contract had been signed.
- 4. A quotation was received from Fred Morganstern to strip and re-wax the tile floors in the community room building (including stairs). The quotation was for \$975.00. Since the money has already been budgeted for this work, Doug and Paul were told to go ahead and have the work completed. They will work with Barb Hoover on determining a date for the work.

Pastor Doug moved that we ask Skip Hursh to examine the roof over the office wing and determine whether that roof must be replaced before next winter. If so, the Guardians will

call a special meeting in order to determine how to proceed.
All were in favor.

The Guardians had continued general discussion about what capital improvements need to be done.

Mike Murray will address increasing the sound volume in the sanctuary when guest speakers are preaching.

Pastor Doug reported that he met with Janis Marhenke to discuss Faith Encourager ideas for the fall and winter.

Pastor Doug will teach the children's program June 2 – July 7.

Janis Marhenke and Ashley DeFransisco will go to the Resource Center to look at new Sunday School curriculum within the next 4 to 6 weeks.

Ashley is currently organizing the VBS program and continues to need volunteers. Citi-Church and the Presbyterian Church have been asked to increase their donation amounts for VBS.

TABLED UNTIL NEXT MEETING:

Budget considerations for 2014 including Thrivent money, the Kitchen Remodel Account, development of a Gift Account, a Carry-over Account for the beginning of each new year, where to designate end-of-year surplus money and, refinancing the Building Loan.

The Guardian's next meeting will be June 26, 2013 at 7 pm. Stacy Wright volunteered to do devotions.

The meeting was adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.
