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

NEOS Bishop Elizabeth Eaton elected ELCA presiding bishop



PITTSBURGH (ELCA) - The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Northeastern Ohio Synod, was elected Aug. 14 presiding bishop of the ELCA at the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. She was elected on the fifth ballot. There were 889 votes cast, and 445 votes were needed for an election. Eaton received 600 votes and the Rev. Mark S. Hanson, ELCA presiding bishop, received 287. Eaton is the ELCA's first woman presiding bishop-elect.

The churchwide assembly, the chief legislative authority of the ELCA, is meeting here Aug. 12-17 at the David L. Lawrence Convention Center. The theme for the triennial assembly is

"Always being made new." This year marks the 25th anniversary of this church.

We are a church that is overwhelmingly European in a culture that is increasingly pluralistic. We need to welcome the gifts of those who come from different places, that is a conversation we need to have as a church," Eaton told the assembly shortly after the election.

Prior to becoming synod bishop, Eaton served as pastor for ELCA congregations in Ohio. She earned a Master's of divinity degree from Harvard Divinity School in Cambridge, Mass., and a Bachelor's degree in music education from the College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio.



Pastor Doug's Letter: August 22, 2013

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Grace to you and peace from God whom we know as Father, Jesus and Spirit, and who knows us as beloved children.

I am sensing a Spirit Change.

The phrase "sea change" refers to the moment before the movement. The crew of a ship traveling on the seas needs to to be prepared for the change in the waves and the wind so that before the change happens the crew can be prepared to adjust the sails and the steering. The most experienced of seaman can sense the change before it actually happens.

In our church I sense a sea change. That change is not, however, the winds of the world but the wind of the Spirit blowing us in new directions with new force and new possibilities. Now is the time to spread our sails, to be prepared to catch the Spirit's breath blowing us to new destinations.

The Spirit is blowing and asking us the question:

Which direction are you facing?

There are really only two responses to Jesus. Are you facing in his direction and journeying towards him, or are you facing away from him and journeying away from him? Both the direction and the movement matter.

The direction refers to what is most important to you. Are you setting as the focus of your life what God wants or what you want? What do you value the most? Where do you spend your spare time, your spare money, and your spare energy?

The Spirit is blowing and asking us the question:

Which movement are you making?

Are you becoming more like Jesus? The process of being transformed into his image is life long and is brought to completion only upon our resurrection. We all begin at different starting places, and we all have been given different supports and opportunities to be transformed? So really, the question is not: How are you more like Jesus than your neighbor? The question is: How much have I taken advantage of the gifts and the opportunities God has given me? This is what Jesus means when he said, "To those whom much has been given, much is required."

The freedom—and the challenge—in this is that we do not and cannot compare ourselves to others. Instead we compare ourselves to where we were before. We do not look into the eyes of another and, for example, see their sin of needing to be in control, but instead look into the mirror of Jesus and see our

own sin of needing to be in control. Are we taking that "plank" out of our own eye?

The Spirit is blowing and asking us the question:

How are we—St. Paul Lutheran Church—making disciples of our children, our teenagers, and our young adults?

When Jesus had completed his earthly ministry, before he empowered them with the Spirit, he commanded his closest followers to: **Go** and **Make Disciples** of all nations, **Baptizing** them in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit and **Teaching** them to observe all that he had commanded them. He told them - paraphrasing his instruction to the disciples just prior to his ascension— "After the Spirit has filled and empowered you, bring my message to your families, your communities, your nation, and finally to all the world."

There are signs among us of those who are taking seriously his instruction to begin with our families and to pass on to our children the faith that means so much to us. While conversation and teaching and instruction are all important means by which we pass on that faith, what is most critical is who we are. Children are the best lie detectors that there are. They observe our behavior far more than our words.

That is why our own personal growth in becoming more Christ-like is so important. It is also why we quote the proverb: *Faith is caught, not taught.* The habits—for good or for ill—that you do in order to keep you connected to Christ will become the habits that your offspring will also do.

The Spirit is blowing and asking us the question:

Will you pray?

There is an increasing attention among us to the importance and the power of prayer. More of us are encouraging one another to pray. More of us are praying. This is the critical, foundational piece, for ultimately prayer is about direction, movement, and discipleship. Every prayer is turning towards God and every prayer is at its center saying, "Your will be done, not my will."

This, of course, makes all the difference, for when our lives and our church are seeking God's will instead of our own, we are allowing the wind of the Spirit to blow us to the place God wants to take us instead of exhausting ourselves rowing against the waves of the world.

On this day of the Ministry, each of us are asked how will I

MINISTRY GUARDIANS MEETING OF August 21, 2013

Present for the meeting were: Pastor Doug, Lisa Brooks, Michael Murray, Stacy Wright, and Mindy Wood. Chris Laux was out of town on business.

Mike Murray opened the meeting with devotions, reading from Romans 12:14-21. After reflection and discussion, the devotional time was ended with prayer

REPORTS:

The minutes from the Guardian's meeting of July 1, 2013 were reviewed; Mike Murray moved to accept the minutes, Stacy Wright seconded, and the motion was approved.

The review of Treasurer's Report generated considerable discussion since the July report showed that SPLC has a negative balance in both the general and building fund; attendance is also down. The Guardians decided that Chris Laux will make an announcement on Sunday August 25, 2013, to inform the Ministry Body that: (a) giving is down in the General Fund by 6%, (b) giving is down even more in the Building Fund, (c) that this trend is a cause for concern but not for panic and (d) that the Ministry Body give this prayerful consideration. Mike Murray moved to accept the Treasurer's Report, Mindy Wood seconded and all were in favor of making the announcement to the Ministry Body on Sunday.

OLD BUSINESS:

The Guardians discussed the roof situation and briefly reviewed Skip Hursh's proposal. In light of the apparent financial challenges, there was no consensus on whether or not a Capital Fund Appeal was advisable at this time. The sticking point was that it did not seem wise to ask for capital money when operating money is insufficient at this time.

NEW BUSINESS:

The Guardians had considerable discussion regarding salary and budget considerations for 2014. It was decided that the Guardians will pray over, think over, and get some input from the Finance Team regarding the following principles:

Salaries will be set by the Guardians during the budget process based on normal and customary wages, and with some consideration given to cost of living, and some consideration given to merit.

The goal will be to have the General Fund and the Building Fund have a carryover balance at the end of the fiscal year equal to two months expenses. If there is any surplus above and beyond that, the Ministry Body in assembly will decide how to distribute it.

It was decided that Pastor Doug and Chris Laux will appoint a Stewardship Team for a Stewardship Campaign if the Guardians decide this is necessary

The Guardians approved Pastor Doug's request to attend the second training for Formational Prayer, September 4-7, 2014 The Guardians approved pastoral candidate, Rick Jensen to preach at St. Paul on September 15

The Journey Forward Team has lost Lane Leedy, due to her move to Bowling Green.

Tabled until next meeting or later date: Sunday School Curriculum update, Ashley's Youthquake request, debriefing of Work Camp experience/concerns about funding of Work Camp, a possible Ministry Team debriefing, the need for a Budgeting Process change and setting the fall calendar for evaluations, meetings and budget.

The Guardian's next meeting will be September 11 at 7pm to primarily discuss Youth Ministry and Journey Forward concerns. Lisa Brooks volunteered to do devotions.

The meeting was adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.

Bishop's Letter: Written August 8, Prior to her election

I have a friend who occasionally uses a story to describe his ongoing struggle to recognize and use time and space effectively.

Many days when he is trying to make it to the next item on his extensive to-do list, he looks up and imagines himself a turtle, on a racetrack. (The Indianapolis 500 racetrack. On race day. And the starter has just been activated.) A chicken would have a better chance of getting to the other side of the road. In such situations he often feels that his only chance of getting across the track is a crash that stops the race. He wonders why too often, it is the suffering of others that actually forces him to stop long enough so that he can cherish moments, remember history, recognize the importance of space and seek community, all of which allow him to make sense of the events taking place all around us, right now.

In our contemporary economy of time and space, we can find ourselves not just distracted, but overwhelmed, by people to whom we are accountable and by work for which we are responsible. We can miss the precious moments and sacred spaces that reenergize us, reestablish our sense of purpose, reaffirm that we value truth, freedom, love, forgiveness and grace. We can forget that we need time and space to help us remember that God is here.

The George Zimmerman trial and the illness and birthday of Nelson Mandela have demanded that I take some precious moments and find some sacred space to discern God's presence and power right now. I yearn to see something different. I want to remind myself of, and relearn something from our history. I want to assess my relationships and check assumptions about others. I want to remember God's continuing activity in human history, discern something about where God has been and what God is doing right now.

I share with you something that has helped me recognize God's presence and has helped me glimpse precious time and holy space in the midst of the chaos. These are excerpts from reflections on the life of Nelson Mandela by South African pastor and anti-apartheid activist, Allan Boesak.

THE ONE WHO LINKS US TO ALL WHO SUFFER

As Nelson Mandela sits in the village of his boyhood, ... he dreams dreams for his country, his continent, and the world. As with the biblical Joseph at the end of his life, those dreams are neither reminiscences nor grudges, they are hopes for South Africa, the African continent and for the world. Mandela hopes for and dreams of freedom, and for him freedom is not a grandiose idea

or a magnificent ideal. It is the simple needs of God's little people to live in peace in their own homes, not to go hungry, to have dignity. It is their dreams of having dignity, worth, hopes, security, peace and belonging. Mandela turns his mind...to the simple dreams of those whom the world does not regard; those of unimpressive proportions who have no strength or permission to speak, but whose wounds speak for them. In doing this he reminds us that the shape of a just world lies in the fulfillment of the hopes of the poor and powerless, the silenced and the downtrodden...

Mandela might be the revered "father of the nation", the first democratically elected president of a free South Africa. He might have seen the dawn after the long night of oppression, and he has indeed seen power wrested from the hands of the apartheid oppressor. But with clarity of mind and integrity of heart he knows his people are not yet free from hunger, fear and the indignity of an unfulfilled life.

Nearly at the end of his life, he sees his nation and the world through the eyes of those whose suffering has still not ended...he looks at the world...as a hope-filled captive of ubuntu. My humanity and my human wellbeing is caught up in your humanity. I cannot be what I want to be until you are what you need to be.

As he grows old, he does not look back in selfsatisfaction. He does not wallow in or claim merit for his suffering those 27 years he spent needlessly in prison. He does not bemoan the fact that his eyes have grown weak because of the dust of the stones he was forced to break on Robben Island. He does not cuddle the grudges he may rightfully hold: He does not curse apartheid's cruel rulers who forced him into a choice for violence when all peaceful efforts were crushed, or vent his anger at the white judges who condemned him as a terrorist when he fought for the freedom of his people. He does not begrudge nor regret the fact that he offered white South Africans forgiveness even if it now looks as if they did not all deserve it. ... His love remains constant for all his people.... He knows it is now time for greater, purer things. As he grows ancient ...There is a wideness in his gaze that takes in all the world as he hopes for freedom from fear, from hunger, from indignity for all God's children in all of God's world.

He hopes for "a cadre of leaders" who will work for freedom, security and justice, ... And as he speaks he

remembers in the only way that is authentic: "As we were..." ...The words recall the brave youth of Soweto who marched in 1976, inspired a whole new generation across the country and forever changed the shape of the struggle. With the words, "as we were", Mandela places himself and the people of South Africa in the midst of the global community - wherever there is injustice, pain, struggle, and wherever people still seek hope and find her in their stride toward freedom.

...So, instead of mindlessly deifying Mandela, as the world has so consistently done, thereby making his acts of magnanimity and justice unattainable and his words of hope meaningless for "ordinary" human beings, the world might simply try to learn from the life of this man who now refers to himself as "ancient as the hills of Qunu," that old hatreds do not pass of their own volition. They have to be challenged and overcome by the power of love and the resilience of reconciliation. The lines of tribe will not dissolve on their own: they have to be overcome by our belief in and work for our common humanity. A new era of peace will not be ushered in on the wings of historical inevitabilities, but through the hard work for the ending of war, aggression, terror and the idolatrous worship of violence as the solution to all our problems.

...Perhaps as well, we shall do well to remember that in all this work we shall not look for approval from the powerful or even for admiration from the powerless, but humbly accept that what we are doing is for the humanization of the world.

And that, after all, is why we are here.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

On February 26, 2012 Trayvon Martin was shot and killed. On July 13, 2013 George Zimmerman was acquitted of second degree murder. Of all the events related to this case these are probably the only two that all Americans can agree upon. In the year and a half that this case has been in the news it has become clear to me that white Americans and black Americans have a very different experience of the country we both call home.

Some would say that George Zimmerman followed Trayvon

Martin because he was acting suspiciously. Some would say what made Trayvon Martin seem suspicious was the color of his skin. We may never agree. If we set aside the Martin -Zimmerman case, which has become inflammatory, we still have examples of people of color being profiled - the president reported being profiled when he first came to Washington DC as a new senator. The Tanzanian companion synod bishop, while a guest of Northwestern Ohio Synod bishop Marcus Lohrmann was picked up by the local police as he walked in Bishop Lohrmann's neighborhood. Store personnel and the police are not evil people. They are ordinary people. But somehow we all find ourselves in a society of suspicion. I am white. Being profiled is not part of my experience. Wondering if I am being judged by "the content of my character and not by the color of my skin" is not part of my experience. But it is the experience for people of color. We, in the white majority, need to acknowledge that our reality is not a universal reality. As forgiven sinners all of us need to be willing to risk an open and honest dialogue about the realities of race in America.

I want to introduce you to the Rev. Terrance Jacob who will begin serving as our synod's director of evangelical mission on August 19. Pastor Jacob comes to us by way of (most recently) California and Minnesota where he has served as DEM and parish pastor, respectively; and before that, South Africa where he served as director of the Gamaliel Foundation SA office and as a parish pastor. He is fourth generation South African, his ancestors, Christians, having come from India 150 years ago as indentured servants. He is married to Crystal Jacob, an educator. Their son, Kemuel is 18 and their daughter Sharai is 16.

In his own words, here is how Pastor Jacob describes his calling: As a person passionate about the church and its role as a vehicle for God's grace to the world, both to call the world to salvation in Christ and to proclaim God's justice; with my experience in community building and developing strategies for transformation, coupled with my passion for the church to be leaders in the world (being salt and light), I feel called to serve as a transformational leader.

Please welcome Pastor Jacob as he takes on leadership of our Journey Forward process, as he works with congregations to strengthen stewardship practices, and helps us reinforce the understanding that every congregation is a mission station.
